

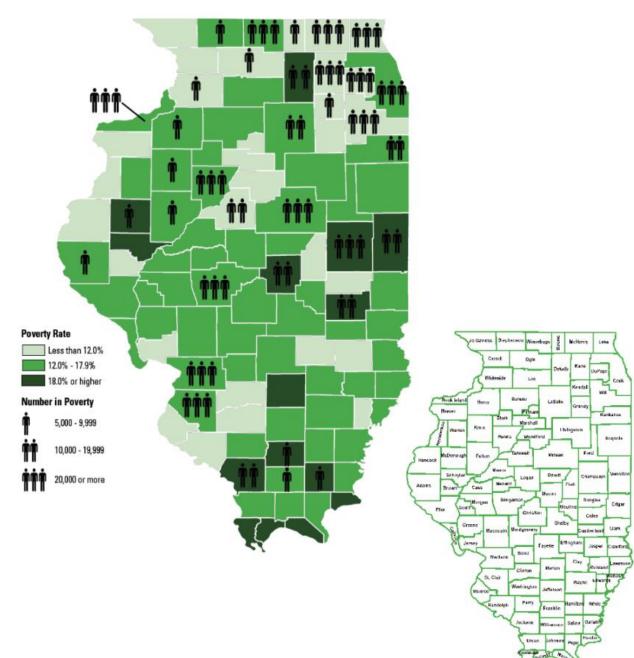



- In all the Counties the predominant race is White (83.2% of 39024 total population).
- The next largest ethnic racial group is African American (7.32%)
- There are negligible numbers of persons of Hispanic,
 Asian Pacific Islander, or Native American background
- Other race is not qualified.








- Unknown race = youth whose race is not identified or assessed
- Other race = identified for youth who do not represent other race categories (e.g. AfAm, AAPI, Hispanic, NA or Unknown)
- There was a total of 960 indicated cases, with most of them being White and African American
- Other racial groups had low numbers of indicated cases, this is fitting to the population rate of other minority groups in the area
- Whites and African Americans had the highest numbers of indicated cases: 739 and 188 respectively
- The highest percentages of Indicated Cases were among Native American (100%) and Unknown (33%) populations

Whites dominated the number Ctakers with a significant number between 20-29 and 30-39 followed by African-Americans.


The rest had a negligible number of Ctakers.

Carbondale Action Team: Reports and Indicated Reports by Reporter Type




- Law Enforcement dominated the number reports with 58% of their cases being indicated followed by Medical personnel with 49% of total their cases indicated.
- However, the percentage indicated was derived from the Total number cases reported as against the Total number cases indicated for each reporter type. Thus, the percentage indicated is relative to each reporter type





- White population in DCFS and POS is high as 266 and 55 respectively.


- White male (162). dominated the race followed by Male African American (41).
- The rest of the race had a low representation.




- White children dominated age by race followed by African- American.

Carbondale Openings by Age & Race




- African-American largely dominated opening by race with 54 cases.
- The rest of the race had negligible representation.



Carbondale Action Team: Placement Type by Race




- African-American and white had 62 and 253 respectively in FOS/REL.

- OTH INST had only 8 African-American and 22 whites.




- African-American 35 and 138 White were REUNIF
- 23 African-American and 144 White were ADOPT/TPR under the goal category
- 11 African American and 40 Whites went independent
- The rest of the race had zero representation



Carbondale Action Team: Permanency by Race



- African-American 51 and 102 White were REUNIF.
- 24 African-American and 102 white were adopted.
- 3 African American and 26 White went a Guardian
- The rest of the race had low representation in all the permanency type.

Disproportionality & Disparity



<u>Disproportionality</u> –

Occurs when the percentage of a group of children in a population is different from the percentage of the same group in the child welfare system.

For example, if 25% of the children in a county were African American, then 25% of those in foster care should be African American, all things being equal. That would be <u>proportional</u>. If these percentages differ there is disproportionality.

<u>Disparity</u> –

Unequal treatment or outcomes when comparing children of color to non-minority children.

For example, if 30% of Hispanic children who are indicated are then placed into care, but only 15% of White children who are indicated are then placed into care, there is a disparity in the risk of entering placement, with Hispanic children at twice the risk to be placed into care outside their homes after indications.

Disparity & Disproportionality examined at 4 critical points:

- Indicated Cases
- Entries into Care (Child Data, by race)
- Child Goal
- Permanencies

- ✓ **Low Disparity** with regards to "Independence" of African American Children
- ✓ Significant Disparity with regards to "Missing" of African American Children
- ✓ **Significant Disparity** with regards to "Other" of African American Children
- ✓ **Low Disparity** with regards to "Reunification" of African American Children

Carbondale has **Low Disparity** with regards to Permanency of African American Children

Disparity ratio on this variable = (number of African American children achieving permanency divided by number of African American children who enter care) over (number of White children achieving permanency by the number of White children who enter care).

No disparity - 0 to 0.99

Low disparity - 1.00 to 1.49

Moderate disparity - 1.5 to 2.49

Significant disparity - 2.5 to 3.49

Goals (FY18)



- Action team wanted to keep up with the new membership
- Action team was keen in conducting frequent meetings with the membership to discuss permanency concerns
- Action team was determined to support new action team leader and assistance.
- Action team wanted to explore innovative ways of communication with the membership

Annual Activities (FY18)



- Team meetings regularly (at least once a quarter).

 Meetings were held on November 2, 2017 and March 29, 2018.
- Currently in a 'transition period' action team re-constitution, development and membership recruitment activities
- Has identified potential members
- Letter of invitation in development
- Team is actively trying to rebuild Action Team.

Concerns/Barriers (FY18)



Concerns/Barriers

- Currently Re-constituting action team and renewing membership
- Transition period, due to new leadership (i.e. the action team leader is new)
- No Current data supplied by Division to assess current service data trends and updates on permanency numbers for region

RESPONSE to Concerns/Barriers

- Explore use of innovative communication strategies (i.e. phone conference call or video conference meetings such as Skype to overcome barriers with traveling time and accessibility)
- Support new Action Team Leader, in new role and offer assistance [from past/current Action Team Leaders across system, past/current Action team members, and University Partners

Outcomes (FY18)



- Working on reconstituting the action team.
- Team is Implementing survey to assess support needs of 'Action Team' to garner ongoing specified support form University partner which will further specify work with local community.

Future Directions (FY18)



- Continue to Build Action Team membership.
- Implement survey to assess support needs of 'Action Team' to garner ongoing specified support form University partner which will further specify work with local community
- Solicit and await the arrival of updated data to continue to assess area permanency rates
