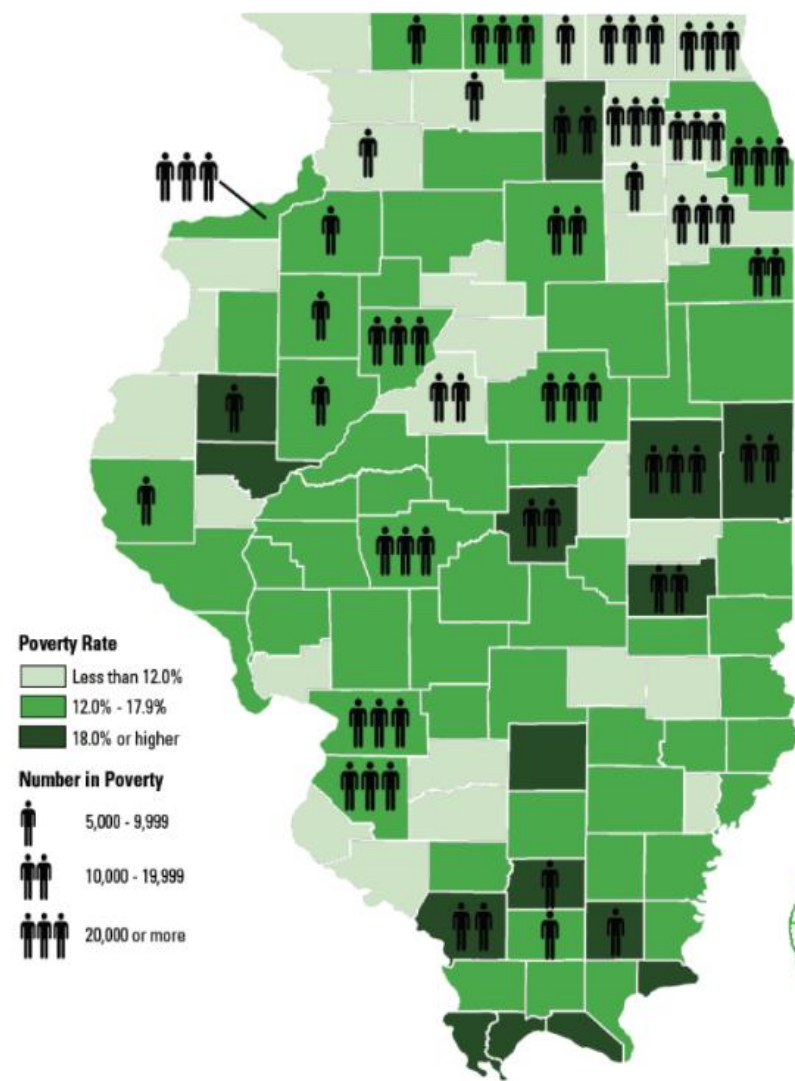

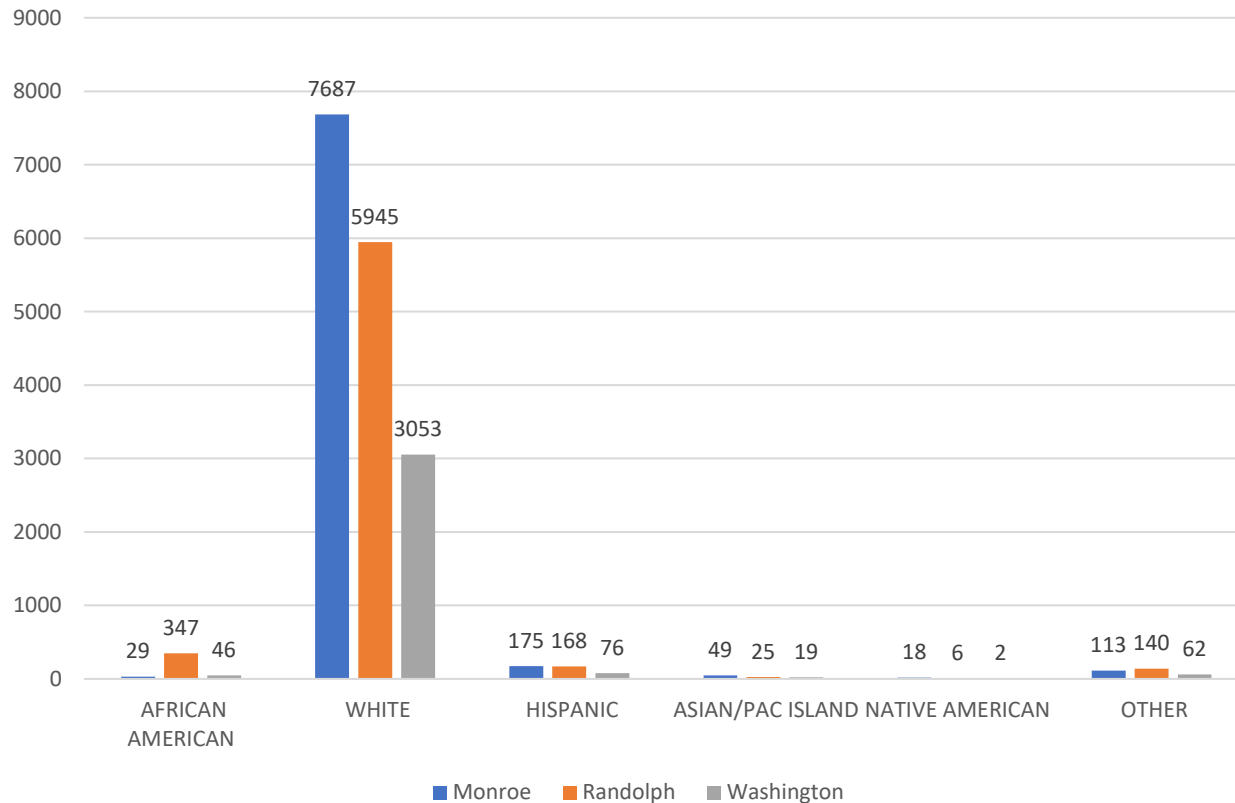

Sparta Census 2010 Summary



- The total Child population of Monroe is 8,071.
- The total Child population of Randolph is 6,631.
- The total Child population of Washington is 3,258.
- In all the Counties the predominant race is White (92.9% of total population).
- The next largest ethnic racial group is African American with 2.34%
- There are negligible numbers of persons of Hispanic, Asian Pacific Islander, or Native American background
- Other race is not qualified.

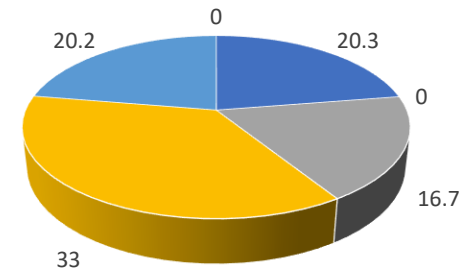

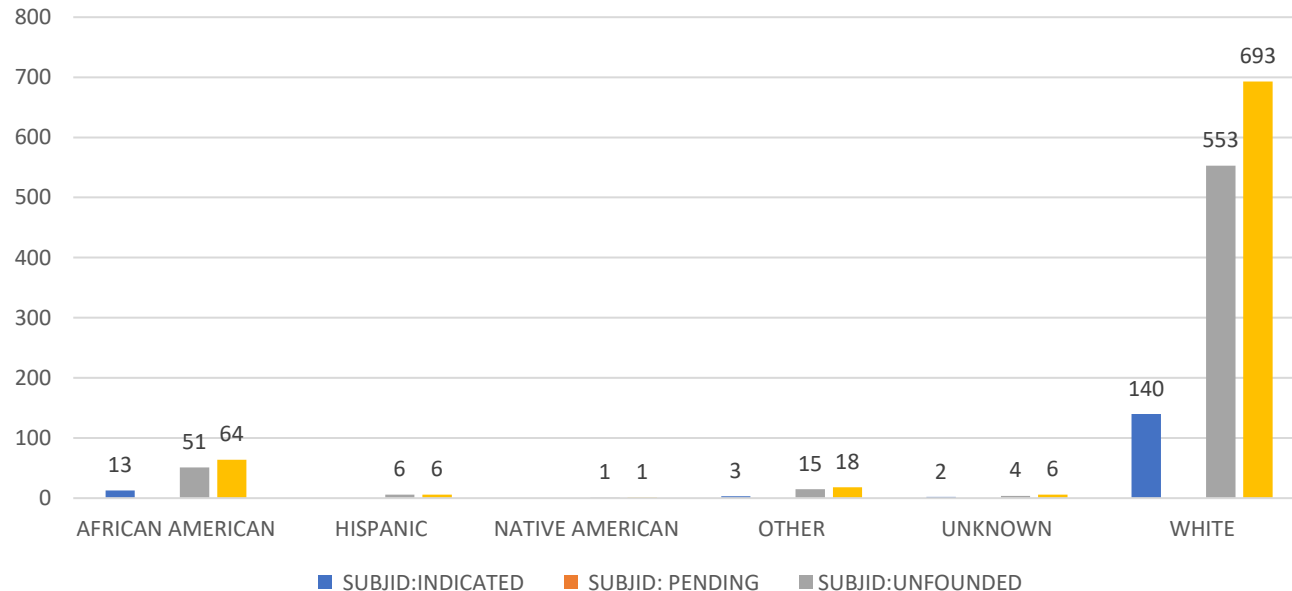

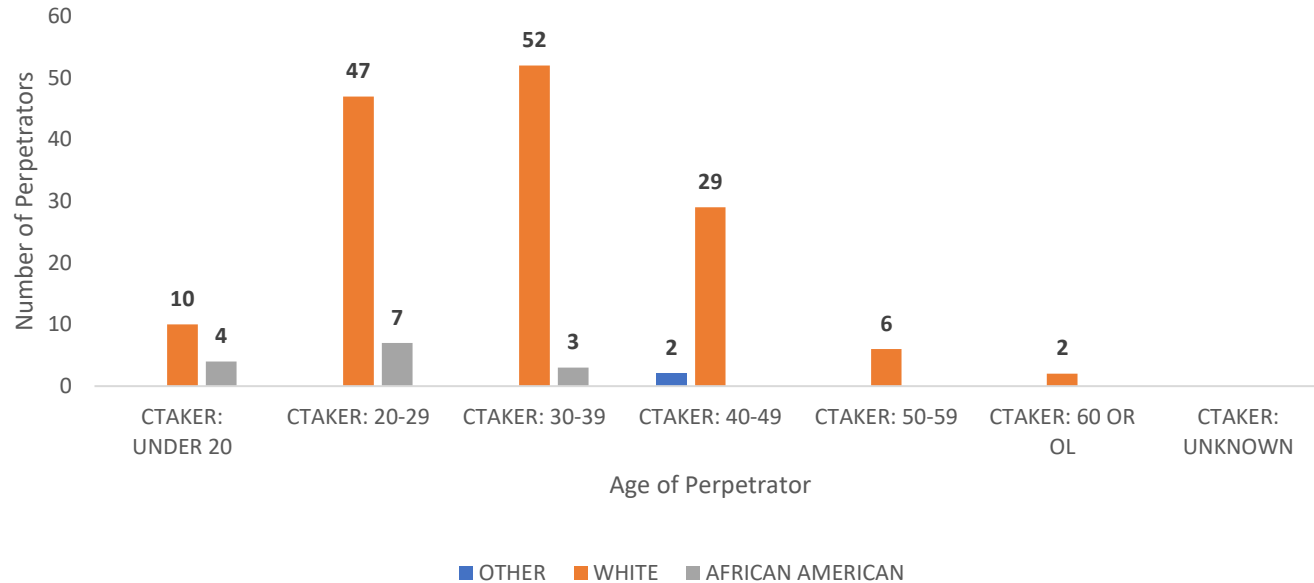


- Unknown race = youth whose race is not identified or assessed
- Other race = identified for youth who do not represent other race categories (e.g. AfAm, AAPI, Hispanic, NA or Unknown)
- There was a total of 158 indicated cases, with most of them being White and African American
- Other racial groups had low numbers of indicated cases, this is fitting to the population rate of other minority groups in the area
- Whites and African Americans had the highest numbers of indicated cases: 140 and 13 respectively
- The highest percentages of Indicated Cases were among African American (20.3%) and Unknown (20.2%) populations

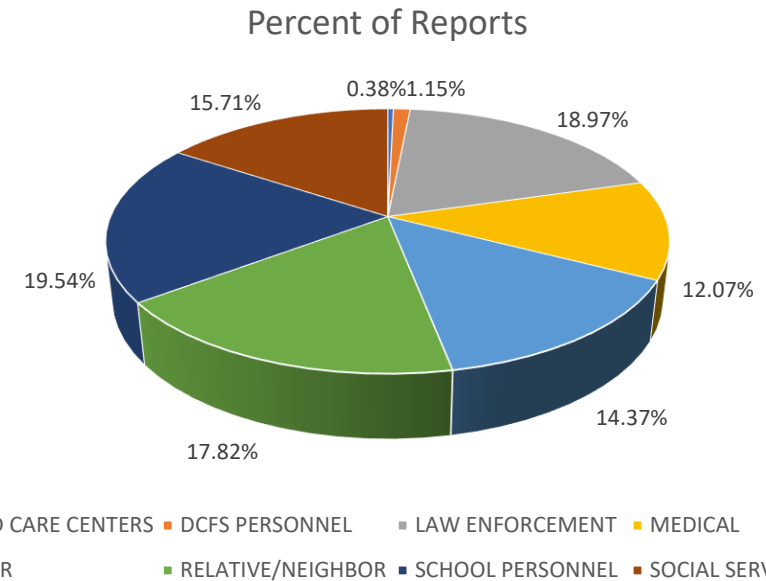

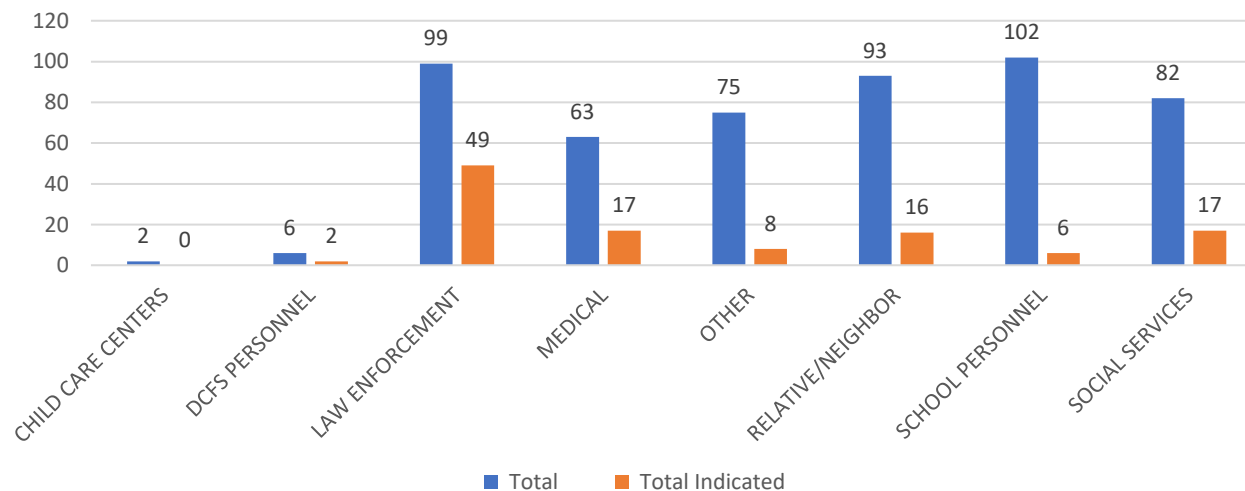
- Whites dominated the number Ctakers with a significant number between 20-29 and 30-39 followed by African-Americans.

Sparta Action Team Reporter Type

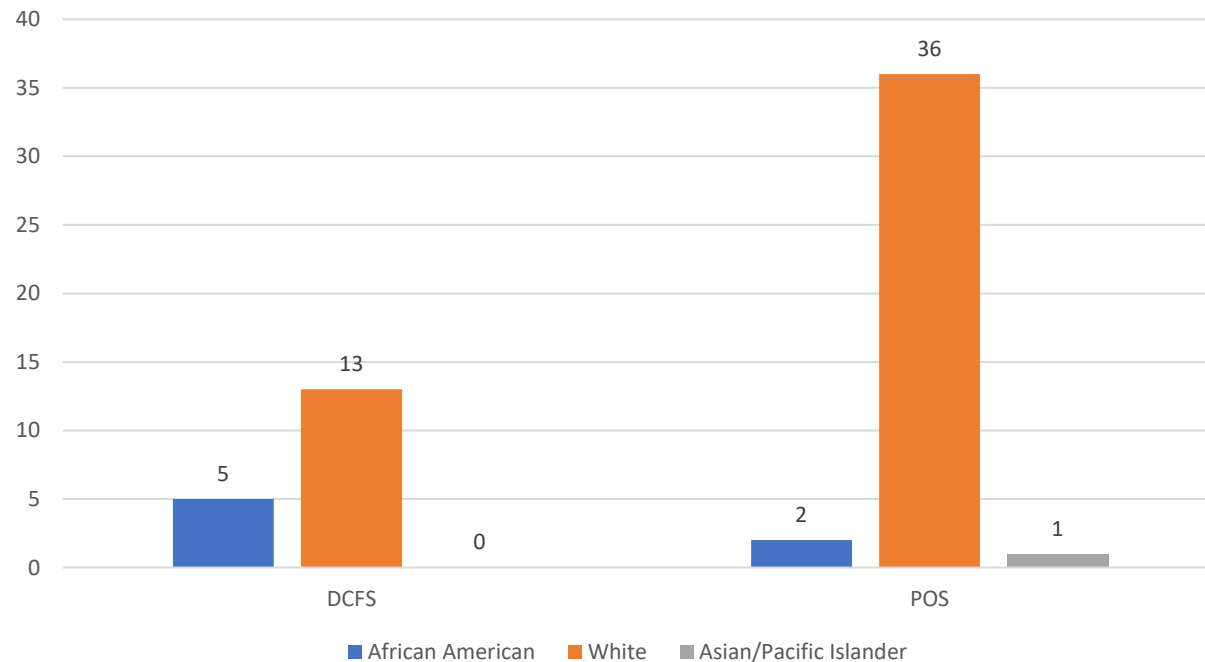


- Other reporter type dominated the number reports with 49.49% of their cases being indicated followed by law enforcement with 33.33% of total their cases indicated .

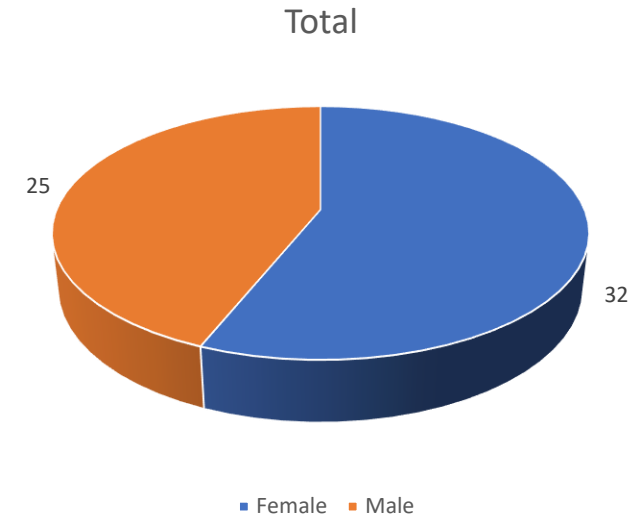
Sparta Child Data by Race



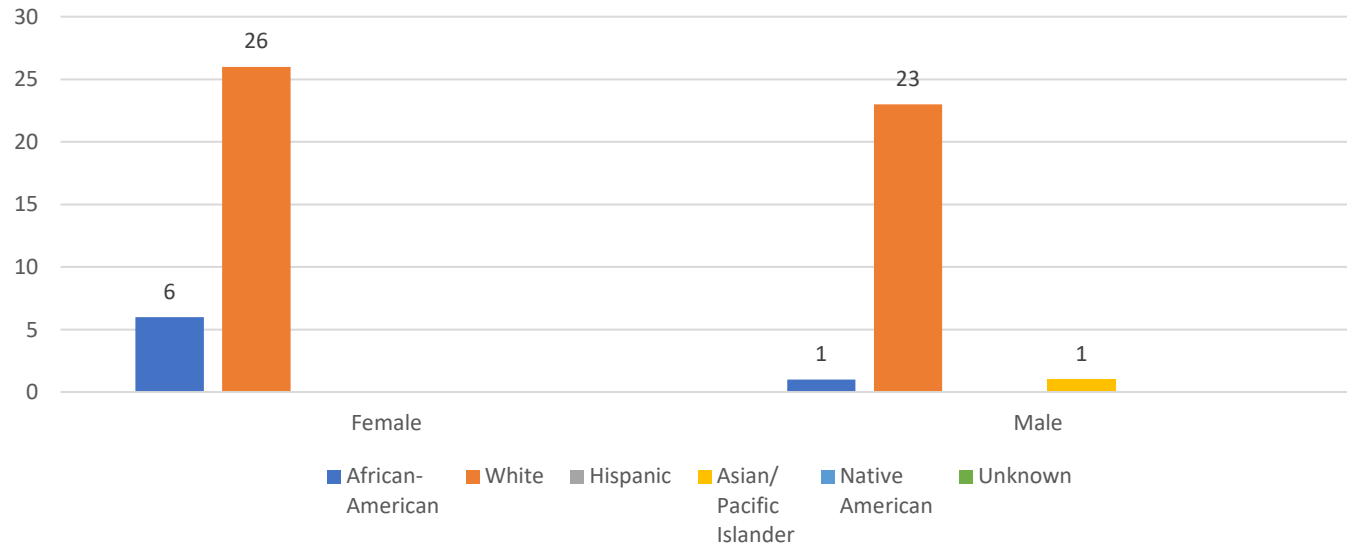
- White male (110). dominated the race followed by Male African American (7)

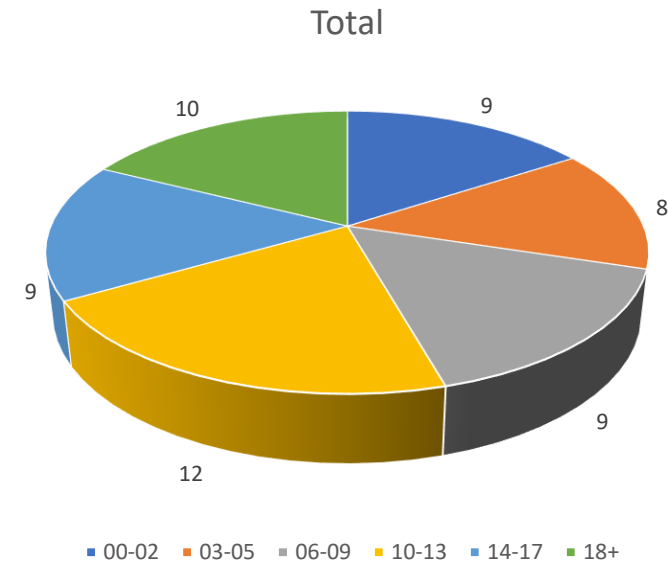
Sparta Child Gender by Race



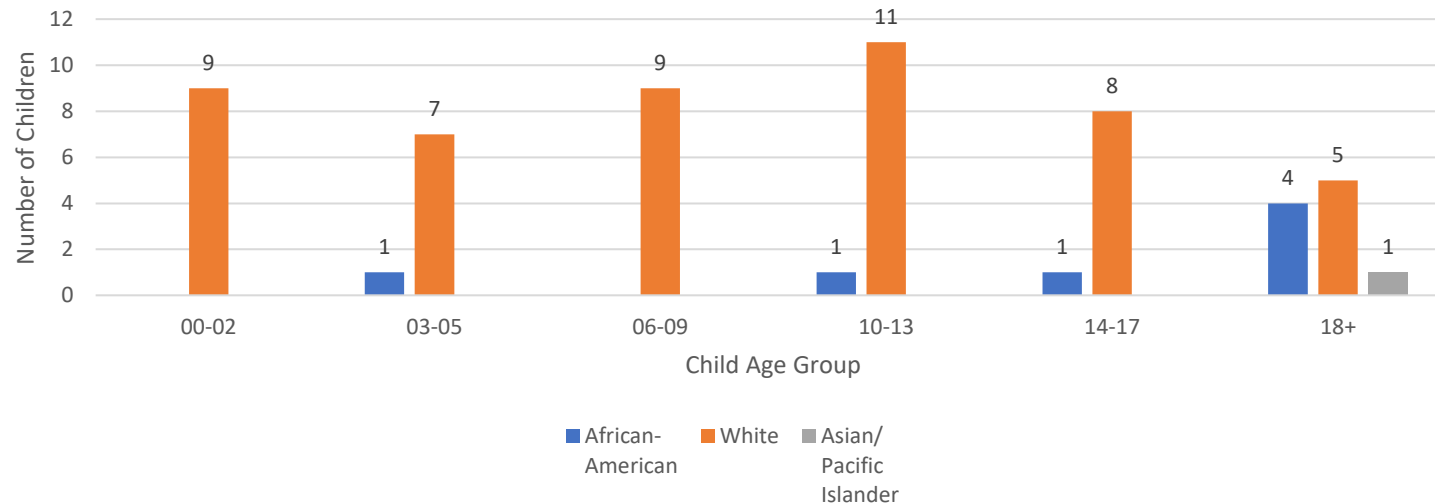
- The Female and Male numbers are almost equal.

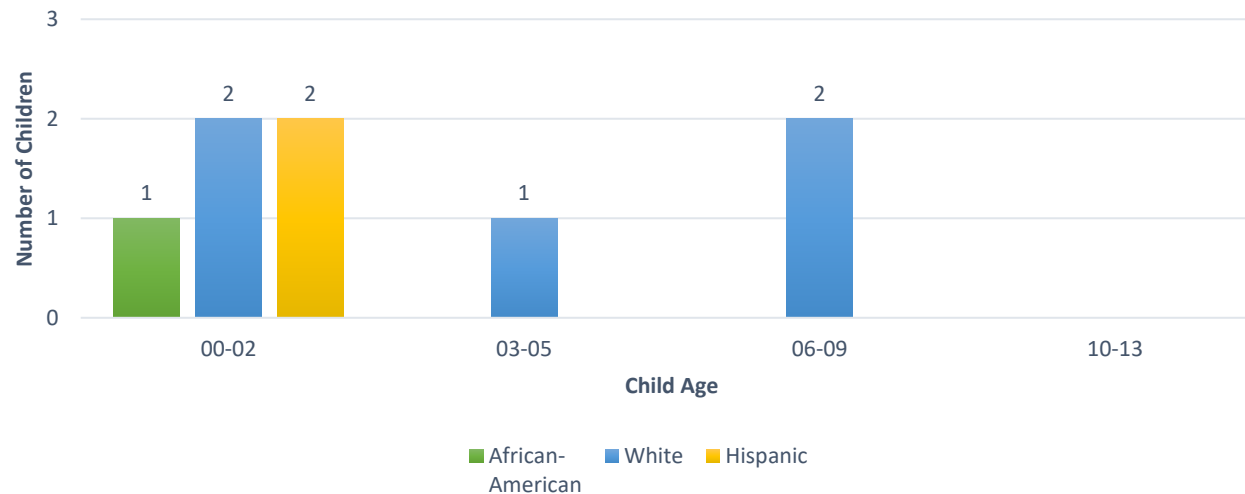

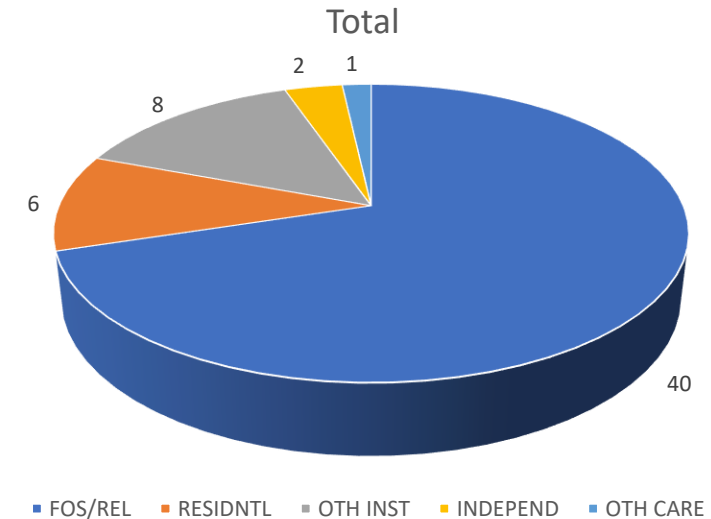

Openings by Age and Race

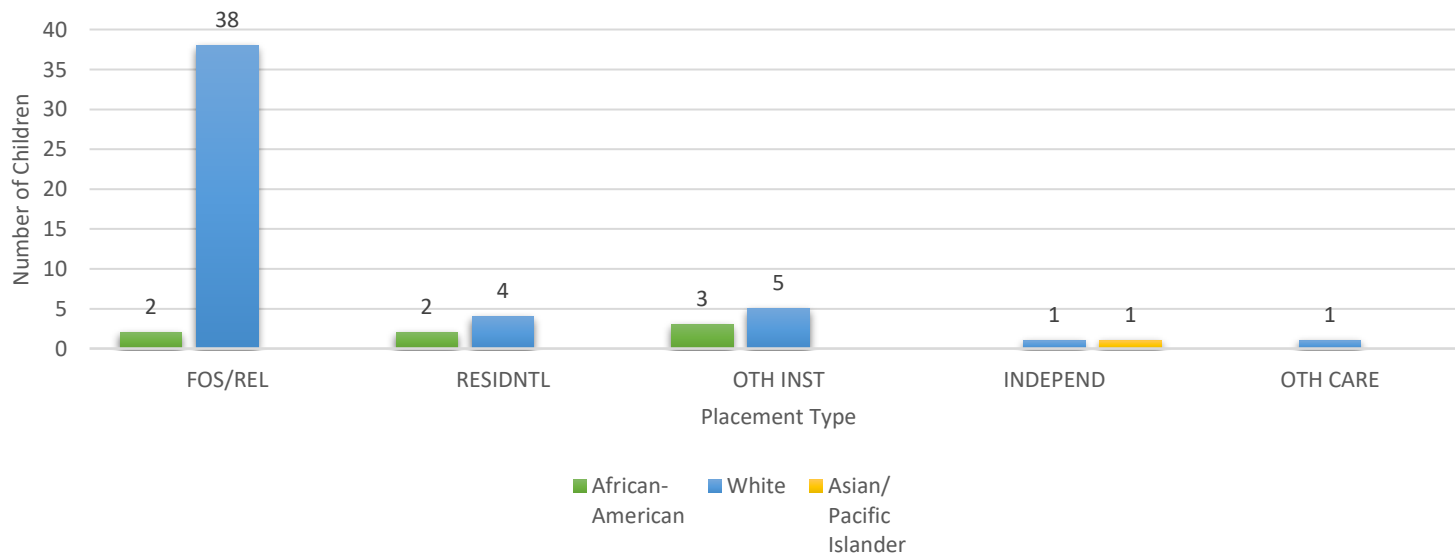

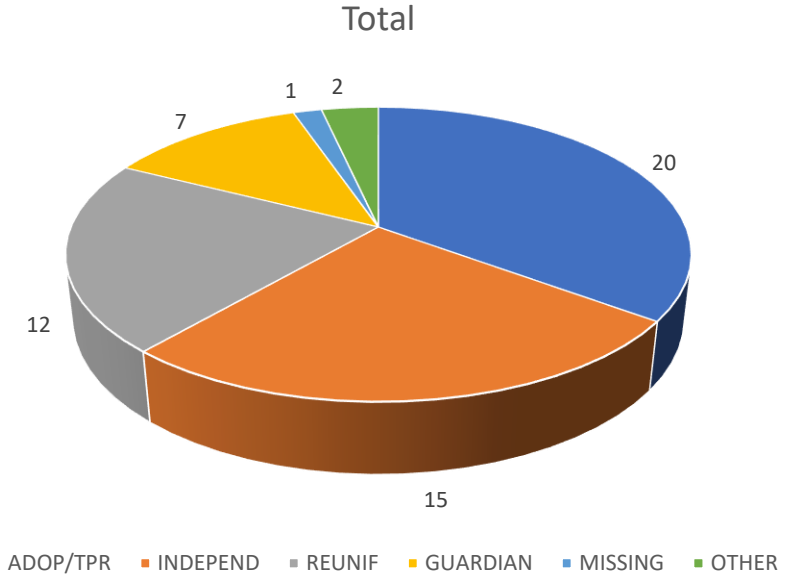
Sparta Action Team: Placement Type by Race



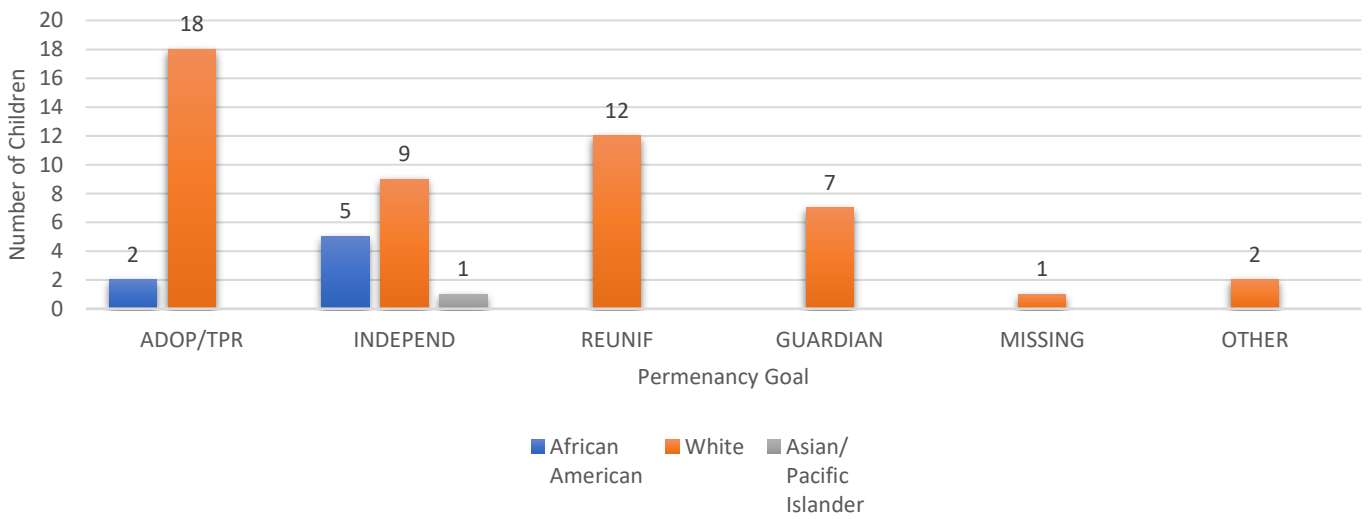

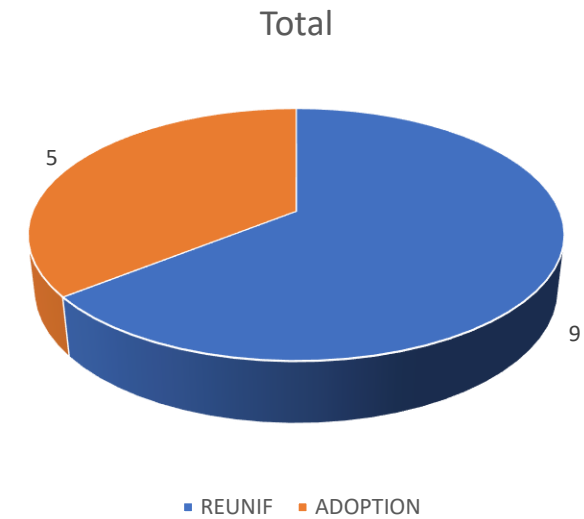
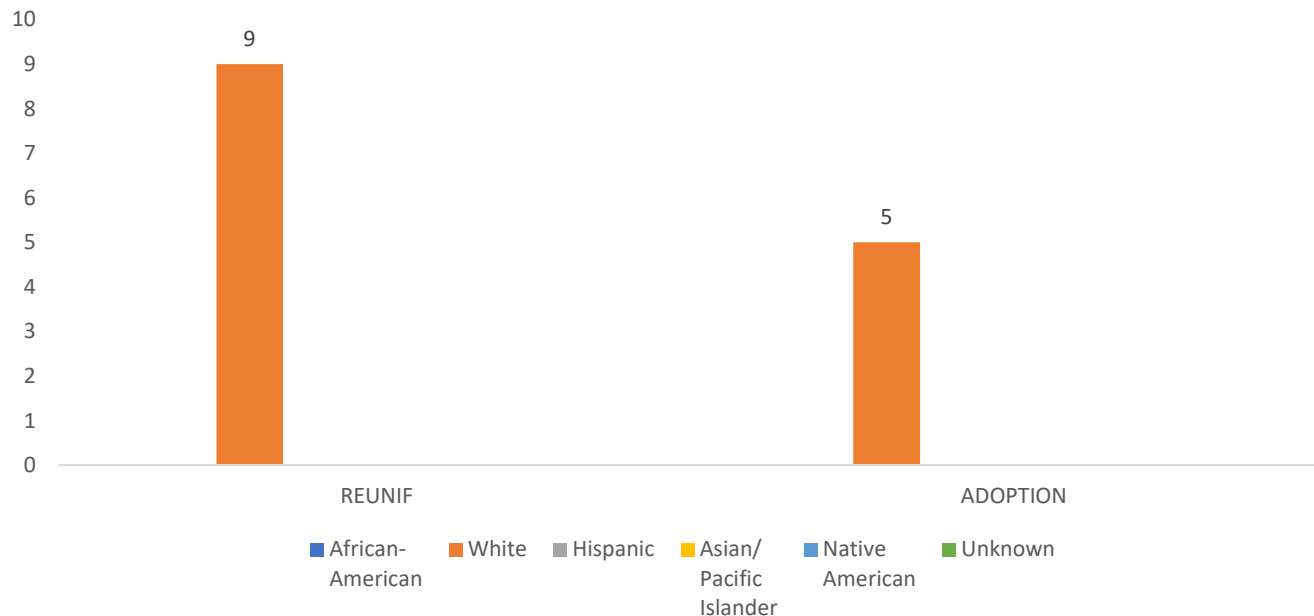


- Whites were 18 in ADOP/TPR dominating all other categories.

- Whites were 9 in REUNIF dominating other placement types.
- The rest of the race had zero representation in all the permanency type.

Disproportionality & Disparity

Disproportionality –

Occurs when the percentage of a group of children in a population is different from the percentage of the same group in the child welfare system.

For example, if 25% of the children in a county were African American, then 25% of those in foster care should be African American, all things being equal. That would be proportional. If these percentages differ there is disproportionality.

Disparity –

Unequal treatment or outcomes when comparing children of color to non-minority children.

For example, if 30% of Hispanic children who are indicated are then placed into care, but only 15% of White children who are indicated are then placed into care, there is a disparity in the risk of entering placement, with Hispanic children at twice the risk to be placed into care outside their homes after indications.

Disparity & Disproportionality examined at 4 critical points:

- Indicated Cases
- Entries into Care (Child Data, by race)
- Child Goal
- Permanencies

Disparity ratio on this variable = (number of African American children achieving permanency divided by number of African American children who enter care) over (number of White children achieving permanency by the number of White children who enter care).

Racial Disparity: Indices Category

No disparity - 0 to 0.99

Low disparity - 1.00 to 1.49

Moderate disparity - 1.5 to 2.49

Significant disparity - 2.5 to 3.49

- Working on specific identified needs with attorneys and court system.
- In lieu of not having updated data, as such has not been made available by Division, have used most recent data to frame decision-making.

- Working on expanding the resources for foster parents.
- . Team is working on specific identified needs with attorneys and court systems

Future Directions (FY18)

- plans or next steps for this action team
 - Consideration of full team meetings as needed.
 - Continue to develop and engage in partnership with court systems and attorneys.
 - Implement survey to assess support needs of 'Action Team' to garner ongoing specified support from University partner which will further specify work with local community.
 - Solicit and await the arrival of updated data to continue to assess area permanency trends.
