Course Description: This course is designed to provide an overview of many different theories, research methods and empirical findings of social psychology.

Course Objectives:

- Employ different theoretical perspectives to better understand human behavior.
- Enhance your knowledge about psychological mechanism that underlie perceptions, feelings, thoughts and behavior.
- Learn how people's thoughts, feelings and behaviors are influenced by others.
- Understand how your own behavior is shaped by psychological concepts covered in this course.
- Apply information you have learned in the course to real-life examples and your own personal life.

2. ALWAYS sign your e-mail. Many of you have e-mail addresses that mask your identity.
3. Please treat your e-mails as professional communications. Please use proper grammar, spelling, and punctuation.

Course Requirements and Policies

Assignments are posted in Blackboard throughout the semester and will be due online at the scheduled date and time. The dates of each assignment can be found on Blackboard and in your course calendar at the end of your syllabus. It is your responsibility to make sure that all assignments are completed and turned in on time. Work turned in after the scheduled date and time is considered late work.

Submitting Work

All assignments will be submitted via Blackboard. No emailed assignments will be accepted.

Media Reflection Papers (25 points)

One of the key objectives in this course is to apply what you have learned in this course to your everyday life. As such, you will be asked to write a 1-page summary relating real-life media examples (i.e., movies, TV programs, podcasts, books, etc.) to a social psychology concept covered within that unit. You will be asked to describe the social psychology concept in your own words, then provide some background to your media example, and then explain how the media example showcases the social psychology concept. The media example can be fictional or non-fictional but it has to be a media example. Meaning, you cannot use a personal anecdote. In addition, news or research articles should not be used. After you finish the 1-page summary, you will write a reflection about the topic you discussed in your paper. The reflection should be at least ½ page long. You will use this reflection to discuss what you learned as a result of this concept, how you can take this concept into your own life (now using personal anecdotes) and anything else that you want to reflect on as a result of this concept. Please see the Media Reflection paper rubric on Blackboard for full details.

Discussions (5 points per each thread)

Each week, you will be asked to answer two discussion questions. Your first thread will be a question I ask you that comes from that week's textbook, lecture videos or additional readings. In addition to answering the question, you will need to reply to at least two of your classmates' posts. For each discussion topic, you will have 2 posts – 1 initial post and 1 reply post. Your initial post is worth 3 points, and your reply post is worth 2 points (total of 5 points for each week). In order to receive full credit for your initial post, your initial post needs to be at least 75

words, respond fully to the question on hand and provide references to course content that you have to read. Your reply posts need to be substantial replies, meaning they need to say more than “I agree” or “disagree”. You need to point out what exactly you agree or disagree on and why. They should be at least 50 words.

The second thread will be the same every week – come up with a discussion question about something within that corresponding week’s chapter(s). This can be either something that stood out to you, something that you want to know more information about or something else that could spark discussion from that week. Your question or comment should be at least 75 words and spark conversation. You need to write more than something like “What is group identity?” but rather ask a question or make a comment that could spark conversation. To ensure you hit your 75 words, you should provide background information for why this topic stood out to you AND give a suggested answer to your own question to give your classmates an idea of what you are thinking based on this question. Then, you will need to respond to at least one person’s question/comment to receive full credit. Your reply post should be more than just “this surprised me too” but rather add to the thread either by answering the question or providing more explanation to their comment. Your question/comment will be worth 3 points and your reply post will be worth 2 points. The last week of the class you will NOT have a discussion question thread.

Guidelines for discussions:

- Initial posts for both discussion threads are due THURSDAYS at 11:59 p.m.
- Reply posts for both discussion threads are due Sundays at 11:59 p.m. If you do not complete an initial post you will not receive credit for the reply post. ** please note this date will change for the final week**
- You must post your replies in the textbox of the discussion board – no word document submissions will be counted.
- You must sign your name at the end of your discussions. This shows you are taking accountability for you have said. If you do not include your name at the end of your posts, you will receive 1 point deduction for each post. If you consistently do not sign your name (i.e. it happens multiple weeks in a row), you will not receive credit for your discussion.

The point of these discussions is to dive in deeper to these journal articles and topics in the book. Articles will be posted in each unit folder for you to read.

Extra credit opportunities:

If you reply to a classmate’s response on your thread, you can earn 1 point of extra credit per response. Only a max of 3 replies can happen per thread.

Chapter quizzes (5 points each)

Each week you will cover ~2 chapters and will have chapter quizzes to test your knowledge. These quizzes will be a combination of multiple choice and true/false. You have unlimited attempts at the quizzes, and blackboard will count your highest grade. However, please note that every time you retake the quiz, you will see a new set of questions and you will be unable to see your missed questions. These quizzes will help reinforce your knowledge and also serve as

preparation for your exams. Quizzes will be due at the end of the week and cannot be turned in late.

Exams (75 points each)

There will be a total of 2 exams in this class: a midterm and a final exam. Both exams will be open for 75 minutes and once started, the exam must be completed in one sitting (i.e., it cannot be paused and resumed at a later time). These exams will be open note and open book, but not open google. Due to these time constraints, it will be necessary that you study. Any material presented in the lectures or your textbook are fair game for an exam. Your exams will be a mixture of multiple-choice questions and short answer questions. Exams will open up on Friday of each week at 12am and close on Sunday at 11:59p.m. ***Note: Except your final exam, which will open at Wednesday 12am and close on Friday at 11:59p.m.***

Please ensure that you have a reliable computer and Internet access when you choose to begin the exam.

Syllabus Quiz (10 points):

All students will need to complete a syllabus quiz at the start of the semester. The syllabus quiz will be completed online through blackboard. Please check the course calendar for the date of the quiz.

Pre – and Post – Course Quizzes (Extra Credit)

There will be chance to earn up to 3 points of extra credit by completing these quizzes. This will be to test your knowledge before and after taking the course. They are extra credit!

Course Questions

It is natural for everyone to have questions and I want you to feel comfortable asking questions. That said, in some cases, students ask questions that could be easily answered by looking in the syllabus or course materials. In order to facilitate personal responsibility, I ask that you follow the “rule of 3 then me” before asking a question. If your question is about the course requirements or some aspect of the course check in 3 places for the answer before you ask me. When you ask me, tell me where you have looked for the answer and explain your question. This helps me understand the question so I can give you a better answer. If you do have a question, you can send me an email.

Technology

This course will use Blackboard (<https://bb.siue.edu>) as the primary vehicle for disseminating class materials. Announcements, lecture videos, assignments, updates, grades, and other important course information will be posted to Blackboard. It is your responsibility to regularly check this course’s Blackboard website throughout the semester. Late or Missed Assignments

Any **written assignment (media reflection papers only)** must be completed and submitted via Blackboard by their assigned time. Assignments turned within 24 hours of due date will receive a **10% deduction**. Assignments turned within 48 hours of due date will receive a **20% deduction**. **Anything more than 48 hours will not be accepted and receive a 0**. Students are responsible for anticipating that technology can often fail and should be in communication with the instructor if necessary, PRIOR to the deadline. Assignments cannot be submitted via email unless communicated with the instructor ahead of time. If assignment is emailed without prior approval, assignment will immediately receive 20% deduction. You are encouraged to confirm that your assignment has been received via blackboard.

Make Up Work: In the event of extreme circumstances (e.g. illness, jury duty, loss of loved one), you must notify me within 24 hours of a missed assignment. We will work together develop a plan to complete your missed work, when appropriate. Documentation may be required at the discretion of the instructor.

A letter grade of A, B, C, etc. will be assigned based on the following scale:

A = 90% or better (360 points or higher); B = 80-89% (320 – 359); C = 70-79% (280 – 319); D= 60-69% (240 – 279); F = anything lower than 59% (239 points or lower).

Final grades are not negotiable. I do NOT round up. There will be opportunity to receive extra credit in this course, but it is your responsibility to work for it. If you are upset about a grade on an assignment, you need to set up a meeting with me to discuss that within a week of the published grade of the assignment. After that, I will not consider a grade dispute. ***I especially do not respond to end-of-semester e-mails that request unearned grade bumps.***

As a student in this course, you will be expected to display university-level writing, which includes completing course assignments that meet the following basic writing criteria. Specifically, all written assignments completed for this course should include:

- clear transitions from sentence to sentence and idea to idea (e.g., paper is organized/flows well);
- verb tense consistency;
- clear and unambiguous sentences and ideas;
- writing that is free of typos, spelling errors, and major grammatical errors;
- properly formatted paper including headings, citations and references, per the 7th edition of the APA manual.

This is by no means an exhaustive list of basic writing skills, but will give you an idea of what we are looking for in our papers. If you feel you need help with your writing, you are encouraged to seek assistance from the writing center on campus (<http://www.siue.edu/is/writing>) or utilize one of the many online resources they have identified to help students (<http://www.siue.edu/lss/writing/resources.shtml>).

If your graded written assignments fail to meet the basic writing requirements listed above (and any others found to be appropriate by your instructor), the instructor will stop the grading process and return the paper to you (see below for the specific policy for this class).

- **The penalty for unacceptable writing in this class is as follows: If more than three writing errors are found on any one page of a written assignment, grading will cease, and the student's paper will be returned with a grade equal to 50% of the total point value for the assignment.**
