Course Description:

Welcome to Psychopathology! In this course, you will learn about common mental disorders and their etiology, course, treatment, and diagnostic procedures. Learning activities include lecture, student presentations, and group discussions.

Course Goals & Objectives:

After successfully completing this course, you should be able to:

- Understand and identify major characteristics of common mental disorder.
- Understand the history of mental disorder classification system (i.e., Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders) and critically evaluate its strengths and limitations.
- Gain knowledge of common mental disorder's psychological treatment approaches.
- Enhanced awareness in community- and/or nation-wide resources/organizations for individuals with mental disorder and their families.

In order to meet these goals, you are expected to:

- Read chapters and understand course lecture material.
- Participate in class activities and discussions.

General Classroom Expectations:

- You are expected to attend all classes. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to obtain lecture material and understand the contents covered in class. If you need <u>clarification</u> on any of the material, I would be happy to meet with you during office hours (or other appointment times).
- I know that some of you prefer to take notes on your laptops, which is fine. However, please refrain from being on non-class related websites (e.g., Facebook, Instagram, Message chat, shopping websites). Also, please take off headphones/ earphones when in class.
- If I see non-class related cell phone use during class, I will collect your phone. It will be returned to you at the end of the lecture.
- All the classes will start promptly on time, and you are expected to come to class on time.
 Repeated late attendances may negatively affect your attendance grade.

Points in this Class

(1) Video Quiz (20 points)

You will watch a video during class time on your own and take a video quiz, which is due on the same day. Please see class schedule for details.

- (2) In-Class Activity (TBD total points)
 - a. We will have multiple in-class activities. For each activity, I will assign 5 points to participating students (i.e., you were in class and did the activity).
 - b. Total points for this activity will be determined at the end of the semester based on the number of activities completed.
- (3) Presentation (50 points) based on quality of presentation and how well discussions/Q & A were done. Prepare ppt or handout.
- (4) Final paper (50 points): Final work showing your work done in class:
 - a. Background literature review including summary and critical evaluations (20)
 - b. Clearly stated research question(s)(10)
 - c. Research method (20)
- (5) Exams (50 points each; 3 exams; 150 total)
 - 1. All three Exams will be in class.
 - 2. Each exam will cover only the material since the last exam (i.e., it is not cumulative). Each exam will cover both lecture topics and information from the assigned readings and will include multiple choice questions. Be aware that all information presented in both the assigned readings and class lectures may appear on exams.

- 3. Exams will be given during this course's class & final exam times. Therefore, class attendance on exam days is a specific course requirement. Please plan to take the exam early if you know in advance that you are going to miss class that day. For example, you can take Exam 1 before the exam day. Same for the other exams. If you want to take the exam early, please email me at least 3 days in advance with the following information:
 - Your full name.
 - The exam you would like to take early (e.g., Exam 1).
 - The date/time you want to take the exam. Please give me a specific 75 minute block (e.g., I would like to take the Exam 1 from 1pm -2:45pm on 2/8).
- 4. If due to unforeseen circumstances you were not able to take the exam before or on exam day, you will be permitted to take a make-up exam on **the final exam date and time.**

Final Grade

Your grade will be assigned based upon a 90% (A), 80% (B), etc., grading system.

Department of Psychology Statement on Plagiarism

Plagiarism includes presenting someone else's words without quotation marks (even if you cite the source), presenting someone else's ideas without citing that source, or presenting one's own previous work as though it were new. When paraphrasing from another source or your own work, at the very least, the student should change the wording, sentence syntax, and order of ideas presented in the paper. Additionally, you should not submit a paper, or parts of a paper, written to fulfill the requirements of one class for the requirements in another class without prior approval of the current instructor and appropriate citation. Ideally, the student will integrate ideas from multiple sources while providing critical commentary on the topic in a way that clearly identifies whether words and ideas are those of the student or are from another source. Plagiarism is one type of academic misconduct described in SIUE's Student Academic Code (http://www.siue.edu/policies/3c2.shtml). University policy states that "Normally a student who plagiarizes shall receive a grade of F in the course in which the act occurs. The offense shall also be reported to the Provost." - How may the article influence you in your future research work? (20 points)
