Course Description:

Welcome to Psychology 111. Course will provide the student with a basic understanding of psychology. Theories and research relating to emotions, abnormal behavior, motivation, learning, personality, methods of therapy, biology and behaviors, developmental psychology, and social psychology will be discussed. Psychology is ultimately the study of people, so it's important for everyone to see how the topics covered in this course apply to the real world of everyday life. We will see that there are some basic psychological processes (e.g., biological, emotional, social) that apply to everyone and other aspects of psychology that vary across different people. In addition, this course is conducted entirely online, which will require you to carefully organize your time and you work to avoid getting behind. I will do all I can to assist you with this, but the responsibility is ultimately yours – be sure to contact me immediately with any concerns about the course or your progress through it.

Goals:

- 1. Characterize the nature of psychology as a discipline.
 - a) the appreciation of the scientific and philosophic roots of psychology.
 - b) the appreciation of the primary objectives of psychology.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of selected content areas of psychology.
 - a) theories and research representing each of the four general domains (e.g., biological, cognitive, social, and clinical).
 - b) the history of psychology
 - c) overarching themes, persistent questions, or enduring conflicts in psychology (e.g., nature versus nurture, mind versus brain).
- 3. Use the concepts, language, and major theories of the discipline to account for psychological phenomena.
- 4. Explain major perspectives of psychology (e.g., behavioral, biological, cognitive, evolutionary, humanistic, psychodynamic, and sociocultural).

Class Format and Requirements:

The course format will consist of readings, online lectures, online quizzes, online midterm and final exams, and an assignment. The online lecture materials will compliment the readings. However, some things will be covered in the lecture that will not be covered in the book. You are responsible for learning everything that is covered in lecture. See below – Tentative Class Schedule).

The notes posted are only an approximation of what will be covered in online lectures. The material on the notes will always be incomplete. The best strategy is to print out the notes and write additional notes on top of them while watching online lectures.

Requirements for Satisfactory Completion of Course:

There will be 14 online quizzes. Those quizzes consist of 4 questions, usually given at the end of each section (e.g., the Biology of Mind). Also, there will be 6 online activities/discussions. The mid-term exam will consist of 60 questions. The final exam will consist of 60 questions. All questions will be multiple-choice format. For the assignment, you will be required to write approximately 7-8 pages paper (including the Title and the References). The assignment will involve searching the literature (references) and providing a critical assessment. More information on the assignment will be provided before June 9th.

Methods for Evaluating Student Performance:

The weighting will be given as follows:

The grade of UW will only be given when a student's grade based on the course requirements is an F. The grade of UW is calculated as an F in a student's grade average. The granting of a grade of I (Incomplete) is not automatic and is available only in cases when a student has completed most of the work required for a class but is prevented by a medical or similar emergency from completing a small portion of the work not later than the end of the following semester. An I must be approved by the instructor with appropriate documentation provided by the student. If an instructor agrees to give a student an I, the instructor will fill out a Memorandum of Incomplete Grade to be kept with the student's records. If the work is not completed by the time specified on the Memorandum, the student's grade will be changed from I to F.

PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT POLICY ON RESEARCH PARTICIPATION

Research is the basis of knowledge in psychology and provides the content in all areas of the discipline. The Department of Psychology typically requires a minimum of six hours of research experience of each student enrolled in PSYC111. However, because this is an online summer class, students need to participate in only one hour online research activities in total. This requirement may be completed by participation in a department-approved study. Failure to complete the minimum research requirement results in a one-letter grade drop, so if a student, for example, had a 'B' in PSYC111 at the end of the semester but failed to complete two hours of approved research experience, the student would receive a 'C'.

Students who make an appointment for research participation, as do the investigators conducting the study, make a commitment to be at the designated place at the designated time for their appointment. If an emergency arises to prevent the participants from being able to be at the appointed time and place, they must notify the investigator no later than one hour prior to the study time. If students fail to come to the study on time or fail to cancel with sufficient notice, they will not receive credit for that study. Moreover, it is up to the investigator to decide whether and when such a participant will be allowed to make an additional appointment for that particular study.
