1. What are your current 3 main areas of research?

- **Organizational change in news companies** - with a focus on the clash between professional norms and organizational norms.
- **Mutual shaping of technology in news organizations** - how they are influenced by new information and communication technologies and how news organizations and institutions shape technology in return.
- **Pedagogy of participatory journalism** - With the dawn of the "networked society," people have unprecedented abilities when it comes to reporting what they see in the world around them.
