 discussion questions/tasks that I will pose for you, as well as to classmates'
 postings.
- What follows is designed to promote vibrant, thought-provoking, courteous exchanges that will enhance the material we cover together face-to-face in the classroom. To that end, it is crucial that all members of this course are aware of proper online behavior. Above all, be respectful of differences and the ideas of others while engaging in online discussions and use appropriate language for an educational environment. Disagreement and spirited debate with authors, the professor, and classmates are okay, verbal attacks are not. Two Part Format:

Initial Contribution

• When you are required to create a new thread, please be sure to completely answer the question(s) asked in the initial discussion prompt. Use complete sentences, proper spelling and grammar, and avoid slang and uncommon abbreviations. Always proofread one final time before hitting submit! You must cite sources if necessary, for example with direct quotes or heavily paraphrased text, and in parenthetical format, i.e. (Poole-Jones, 35).

Responses

• Three substantial responses to other students' postings are required per Discussion Board. In addition, you must "stay on top" of your original thread, moderating your classmates' responses to your post (the easiest way to do this is to "subscribe" to the Discussion Board and/or monitor the "unread replies to me" column). A substantial response is insightful, critical, and constructive; it can be sharing a fact, anecdote, observation or personal experience that is relevant to the discussion; it goes beyond "I agree" or "I had a similar experience/reaction/thought" or "That's neat." In addition, when you are responding to a thread (or comment) within the discussion, it's always a good idea to be clear about who you are responding to, and what part of their statement it is that you are referencing. You may wish to copy and paste the statement you are responding to, as well as adding who said it, and then construct your response.
