

# Serving with Purpose PHARMACY GRADUATES MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN PUBLIC HEALTH

Two members of the Class of 2025, Jason Cole, PharmD, and Matthew Jacquot, PharmD, MPH, have stood out through service and recognition tied to the United States Public Health Service (USPHS).

During Cole's final year at SIUE, he was selected to participate in the **United States Public Health Service (USPHS) Senior Commissioned Officer Student Training and Extern Program (SRCOSTEP).** 

SRCOSTEP provides financial support and officer-level pay to students in their final year of graduate or professional training in exchange for a commitment to serve in the USPHS Commissioned Corps after graduation. Upon graduating, Cole fulfilled that commitment by entering active duty as a USPHS Commissioned Corps officer. He is currently serving with Indian Health Services at the Quentin N. Burdick Memorial Health Care Facility on the Turtle Mountain Reservation in Belcourt, N.D.

"I would like to take this opportunity to develop my clinical skills and enjoy working in a direct patient-care position," said Cole. "I wanted a career where I could interact with patients one-on-one or in smaller group settings. I hope to build a career in the USPHS, wherever that may take me."

Jacquot was honored with the **USPHS Excellence in Public Health Pharmacy Award**, a prestigious national recognition presented by the Assistant Surgeon General. The award, announced during the spring commencement ceremony, recognizes pharmacy students who have demonstrated a commitment to public health and significantly contributed to advancing the USPHS mission to protect, promote, and advance the health and safety of the nation.

"This award is incredibly meaningful because it recognizes the connection between pharmacy and public health, two areas I care deeply about," Jacquot said. "To me, it's not just an individual honor, it's a reminder that public health work matters, even if it's behind the scenes. It motivates me to keep finding ways to serve communities, improve access to care, and advocate for health equity through my pharmacy career."

During his training while at SIUE, he focused on providing patient-centered care, especially for vulnerable populations, and worked on projects in health education, chronic disease management, and deprescribing. He also served in leadership roles and contributed to clinical and community-based initiatives to support better patient care.

"These experiences have strengthened my commitment to making a real difference in the lives of others," said Jacquot.



# Pharmacy Leadership AND MILITARY COMMITMENT

Noah Sutliff grew up all over the country. His father, who has served in active duty as a member of the United States Air Force (USAF) for 27 years, moved his family from Maryland to Alaska, and many states in between. His dad is now stationed at Scott Air Force Base, which is how Sutliff was introduced to SIUE.

"I found SIUE to be a good fit for me," said Sutliff. "I'd be lying if I said SIUE's price point also didn't play a role in my decision."

Now in his third year in the School of Pharmacy, Sutliff says the opportunity to participate in organizations like the American Pharmacists Association (APhA) and the International Pharmaceutical Students Federation (IPSF) has been a highlight.

"Participating in the APhA and IPSF has been a joy," said Sutliff. "Not only have I attended a plethora of conferences and met so many wonderful people, I also have the privilege of guiding our APhA chapter as this year's president. Then there's the international travel, of course, which is second to none."

In July, Sutliff traveled to Portugal through IPSF's student exchange program.

"Working in a few of the many community pharmacies across the bustling city of Lisbon was an experience that was like no other," said Sutliff. "Not only was I able to go behind the scenes and understand how medications are received and distributed to patients, but also the many differences between the profession there and back here in the United States."

What lies ahead may be the most defining chapter of Sutliff's journey. He has committed to a future as a biomedical officer in the Air Force, representing the fourth generation of his family to serve in the military. With an Air Force scholarship covering his final two years of pharmacy school, Sutliff will serve three on active duty and five in the reserves.

"My father likes to joke around and say that I only joined the Air Force because I'm indoctrinated, and there's some validity to that statement. Once you get used to the military lifestyle, it's very hard to transition back to the civilian world," Sutliff explained. "Add in the fact that I'll graduate debt-free and already have a job I'm incredibly passionate about? It was a no-brainer."

Looking ahead, Sutliff hopes that his career will take him to one of the bases overseas. Whether abroad or stateside, he is excited to excel in the field of pharmacy while serving



I am also honored to serve in a national elected role as the 2024–2025 SNPhA National Recording Secretary. This position pushed me outside of my comfort zone, requiring me to complete interviews, deliver a speech, and campaign to members across the country. Now, I oversee the work of SNPhA chapters nationwide as they serve their communities and uphold our mission of serving the underserved—a major accomplishment in my pharmacy journey.

This year, I was selected for the APhA Board of Pharmacy Specialties APPE. This experience will allow me to explore Washington, D.C. and gain firsthand insight into how pharmacy specializations are developed and advanced at a national level.

I will graduate with a Doctor of Pharmacy and a Master of Business Administration in May 2026. After graduation, my goal is to complete a residency in a diverse and dynamic setting that will allow me to specialize and deliver exceptional, patient-centered care. Long-term, I hope to leverage both degrees to enhance the role of community pharmacies and ensure that pharmacists are equipped to provide high-quality, accessible care to the communities they serve.





### Research, Global Learning, and HOLISTIC HEALTH

Small class sizes, affordability, and supportive faculty are why P3 student Anna Rose Diel chose to attend the SIUE School of Pharmacy and take full advantage of the opportunities offered. She has immersed herself in a variety of initiatives during her three years of study, including active participation in the American Pharmacists Association (APhA).

A highlight has been the internship she completed in Ljubljana, Slovenia, this past summer. The opportunity was offered by the APhA Academy of Student Pharmacists (ASP), in partnership with the International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation (IPSF). She contributed to cutting-edge antibiotic research, focusing on the synthesis of fluoroquinolone-NBTI hybrid compounds targeting bacterial topoisomerases. Through this experience, she gained hands-on lab skills in synthesis, reaction analysis, and purification techniques.

"I have such a love for healthy living and want to share this passion with my patients," she said. "I ultimately want to make a positive impact on my patient's overall health and provide care that will increase their longevity through physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual wellbeing."

### Building a Career in PHARMACY

Pharmacy student Jarret Morgan, from Bethalto, first worked in construction but found his passion after taking a job at Alton Memorial Hospital's inpatient pharmacy.

"I developed a genuine curiosity about how medications interact with the body and how pharmacists can make a difference in patients' lives," said Morgan. "At Alton Memorial, I met some incredible SIUE pharmacy students who shared their passions with me and helped in sparking my own."

Now a highly engaged P4 student, Morgan works part-time at the hospital and has achieved much, including:

- Conducting research with Bhargav Patel, PhD, assistant professor of pharmaceutical sciences, and Joseph Schober, PhD, professor of pharmaceutical sciences, to develop a fluorescence polarization assay to screen EIF4F inhibitory compounds
- Holding leadership roles in the Industry
   Pharmacists Organization (P1 Liaison, PresidentElect, President) and strengthening industry
   engagement through presentations, competitions,
   and guest events
- Volunteering with RxTeach, a nonprofit founded by an SIUE alumnus, authoring science-based healthcare articles on atherosclerosis, caffeine pharmacology, and telomerase in cancer
- Leading SIUE's team to third place nationally in the 2024 American College of Clinical Pharmacy Clinical Research Challenge with a mock trial on pharmacist-led post-liver transplant diabetes care
- Completing a Merck summer internship on the Global Scientific Content team in thoracic oncology, supporting clinical trial communications
- Launching a research symposium as Rho Chi Academic Chair
- Creating a P3/P4 mentorship system
- Organizing research talks for pre-pharmacy students
- Co-founding a wellness Run Club with classmate Riley Jackson through the Local American Association of Psychiatric Pharmacists chapter

# A New Era for THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY

The new state-of-the-art, 176,000-square-foot Health Sciences Complex (HSC) at SIUE marks the start of a transformative chapter, housing the SIUE Schools of Pharmacy and Nursing in the same building for the first time. This three-story facility is designed to mirror real-world healthcare settings, offering exam rooms, skill labs, immersive virtual reality experiences, and collaborative learning spaces.

"We are doubling our research capabilities, increasing our teaching and clinical training facilities, and creating space for true interprofessional education to thrive," said Marc Luer, PharmD, FCCP, dean of the School of Pharmacy.

Classes officially began in the new complex this fall—and the excitement is tangible. First-year enrollment in the School of Pharmacy is up more than 30%, a testament to the draw of this groundbreaking facility.





### Twice the Research Space

Cutting-edge laboratories and technologies are devoted to breakthrough discoveries in pharmacology, pharmaceutics, and synthetic medicinal chemistry. Faculty will advance knowledge in critical areas such as pain management, diabetes, cancer, Alzheimer's disease, mental health, substance abuse, and prescription monitoring.

### Pharmaceutical Compounding Laboratory

Top-tier compounding space allows for the study of how physical and chemical properties of compounds interact—supporting the creation of accurate, safe, and personalized medication delivery systems that meet the specific needs of individual patients.

### Pharmacy Clinical Training Center

The center simulates real clinical encounters and prepares students for patient-centered care. In this controlled environment, students learn to recommend over-the-counter medications and counsel patients about both self-care and prescription medications.

#### Grand Lecture Suites

These suites facilitate interprofessional education across the health sciences, support continuing education for regional professionals, and serve as a venue for industry conferences and events.

When Gireesh Gupchup, PhD, immigrated to the United States in 1988, he arrived with limited resources and faced challenges common to many international students. Despite those early obstacles, he persevered and earned a PhD in Pharmacy Practice from Purdue University in 1996, laying the foundation for a distinguished career in pharmacy and academic leadership.

He went on to serve as director of the New Mexico Medicaid Retrospective Drug Utilization Review Program and chair of the Pharmacoeconomics, Pharmaceutical Policy, and Outcomes Research Graduate Program at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center. Gupchup later joined the SIUE School of Pharmacy, as a professor and founding associate dean from 2004-2010, dean from 2010-2018, and SIUE Director of University-Community Initiatives from 2018-2020.

As dean, Gupchup led a period of exceptional growth—expanding enrollment, research funding, and national visibility; launching new degree programs and residencies; and achieving top board pass rates in Illinois and Missouri. His leadership strengthened the School's reputation and laid the foundation for continued innovation.

Today, Gupchup serves as Vice President for Academic Innovation, Planning, and Partnerships for the SIU System. While his role now spans across the System, his commitment to the School of Pharmacy remains steadfast. He is giving back to the School he helped shape by establishing an endowment for international students and/or children of first-generation U.S. residents.

"When I immigrated to the United States, I knew very little and had very little money," he said. "Several altruistic individuals helped me along the way. So, I thought that I could help those re-living my story in a small way. I hope the scholarship can help international students and/or children of first-generation U.S. residents to defray some of the costs of college so they can be the successful leaders of tomorrow."

"Opportunities for higher education do not just provide avenues to secure futures for those who learn, but a brighter, more inclusive, sustainable future for us all," said Debbie Smith. "Educational opportunities provide incentives and strategies for aspiring to our highest possible expression."

The Smiths emphasized that their gift is rooted in admiration for the School's excellence.

"It feels good to support this excellent pharmacy school and its outstanding management and faculty," they said. "We hope our support helps students receive a great education, build a strong foundation for a successful career, and develop a commitment to pay it forward."

The Smiths' generosity was recognized during the University's One Day, One SIUE celebration in April 2025. This annual fundraising event brings together alumni, faculty, staff, students, and community members to support SIUE's mission and initiatives. The 2025 event surpassed expectations by raising more than \$2.8 million from over 2,300 donors.

This year's Chris and Debbie Smith Endowed Scholarship recipient is Jamia Whitehorn, a fourth-year PharmD student and MBA candidate. A first-generation college student from Chicago, Whitehorn arrived at SIUE with a bachelor's degree in criminology and a master's in biotechnology.





# Donor Spotlight THE CLASS OF 2020'S ENDURING GIFT

When the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted their long-awaited graduation plans, the School of Pharmacy Class of 2020 did not just adapt—they innovated. Forced to move their commencement to a virtual platform, these resilient graduates turned their disappointment into an enduring legacy by creating a scholarship.

Redirecting funds originally meant for graduation festivities, the Class of 2020 launched the scholarship as a meaningful act of solidarity with future students. What began as a short-term initiative soon grew into a lasting achievement. With additional support from alumni and matching funds from Therese Poirier, PharmD, MPH, FASHP, FCCP, BCPS—professor emeritus of pharmacy practice and Class of 2020 advisor—the scholarship reached \$25,000, qualifying it as an endowed fund. This milestone ensures that their impact will continue for future pharmacy students.

"We tried to instill in this class from the beginning the importance of giving back and leaving a lasting legacy," said Poirier. "They were the first class to prioritize fundraising for a class gift. Even before graduation, they collected pill bottles to recycle into a bench for the medicinal garden, a gift presented in 2019."

Poirier shared that the idea for an endowed scholarship had been in discussion even before the pandemic canceled their banquet. "The class officers were optimistic about raising enough, and I pledged to match their contributions," she said. The Class of 2020 Scholarship is awarded to a student who demonstrates leadership and the ability to inspire others toward a common goal. This year's recipient, Matthew Jacquot, PharmD, graduated in May with Doctor of Pharmacy and Master of Public Health degrees. He is now pursuing residency at the Minneapolis Veterans Affairs Healthcare System.

# Donor Spotlight THE IMPACT OF RXTEACH

RxTeach, founded by Brentsen Wolf, PharmD, '21, is on a mission to close major gaps in healthcare education through free, accessible, evidence-based content. What began as a side project during a postdoctoral fellowship has blossomed into a nonprofit platform that is making waves across the healthcare landscape.

Originally launched by Wolf during his fellowship, RxTeach began as a platform to share insights on healthcare topics he felt were under researched.

"RxTeach covers a breadth of topics including clinical pharmacy, health and wellness, journal clubs, basic sciences, industry pharmacy, and professional and student development," said Wolf. "We simply want to provide free information to students, patients, and professionals and give back to our community through education."

As its readership grew, the RxTeach team expanded. Kristen Lindauer, PharmD, '21, helped cofound RxTeach as a 501c(3) nonprofit and is the sitting Vice President. She is responsible for most of the clinical content on RxTeach, including the very popular Journal Club articles. Together, Lindauer and Wolf oversee a team of three PharmD authors and one student author.

"RxTeach is an accessible resource for patients and professionals for evidence-based medicine," she said. "We pride ourselves on the autonomy we give our contributors and the credibility of our articles. We research our topics and reference our materials to create a robust library of information."

True to its mission of advancing education, RxTeach donates all profits to fund pharmacy student scholarships, two of which are awarded each year to SIUE School of Pharmacy students:

- RxTeach Health and Wellness through Pharmacy Scholarship supports students interested in lifestyle medicine, chronic disease prevention, and the role of pharmacists in promoting long-term health through nutrition, exercise, and wellness.
- RxTeach Future Oncology Pharmacist Award supports students pursuing careers in oncology or the pharmaceutical industry.
- This past spring, the two scholarships were awarded to Anna Krienert, PharmD, '25, and Brayden Shirley, PharmD, '25, respectively.

As RxTeach continues to grow, Wolf and Lindauer envision an even broader impact.

"We have ambitious goals for RxTeach in the next few years," said Lindauer. "We want to involve more students, whether in article writing or in a more comprehensive way, by forming a full experiential education opportunity. We also want to expand our scholarship reach to additional schools of pharmacy across the country."

# Building Future Pharmacists THROUGH RESIDENCY PREPARATION

The School of Pharmacy achieved a 97% residency match rate for the Class of 2025 through the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP). This achievement ranks SIUE #1 in Illinois and Missouri and #6 nationally among more than 140 pharmacy schools.

One driving force behind this success is the School's Residency Happy Hour series led by Lisa Lubsch, PharmD, BCPPS, clinical professor in the Department of Pharmacy Practice. This extracurricular program is an impactful resource that helps students navigate the competitive residency application process.

"These sessions help our students identify where they want to go and how to get there," said Lubsch.

Held once or twice a month, the series covers a wide range of essential topics, including how to research residency programs, prepare for interviews, understand the National Matching Service, and build strong application materials. Sessions also feature insights from faculty, alumni, and current residents.

The Residency Happy Hour continues to prepare students not just to match, but to thrive in the next phase of their pharmacy careers.

# How School of Pharmacy Staff ENHANCE THE STUDENT EXPERIENCE

School of Pharmacy staff contribute to the School's success in various meaningful ways, serving an essential role in supporting students and shaping the overall academic experience.

"Our staff's work is not just behind-the-scenes. They're deeply embedded in the curriculum, leading debriefings, teaching, coordinating courses, and even acting as standardized patients. They're essential to how we support students and continually improve the program," said Jingyang Fan, PharmD, assistant dean of academic affairs.

In Spring 2024, the School implemented annual debriefings to gather student feedback on the curriculum, faculty, staff, administration, and the overall program experience. These debriefings are distinct from existing Student Evaluations of Teaching (SETs) and course reviews, which primarily provide standardized, quantitative data.

Unlike surveys administered at graduation, debriefings offer insights that allow for more timely and meaningful course improvements. Staff members facilitated these sessions, creating a comfortable environment for students to share honest feedback.

"Staff members play an important role in these conversations because we are not directly involved in curriculum development or course instruction," said Tessa Keys, Improving Patient Care for Tomorrow (ImPaCT) coordinator. "This distance helps students feel more comfortable sharing honest feedback. This feedback is shared with faculty and staff who use it to make timely and meaningful improvements that continue to strengthen the program and its outcomes."
