

BACKGROUND

 Increasingly more institutions are offering dual degrees in align with their respective programs of pharmacy, with the most common dual degree being a dual doctor of pharmacy (PharmD)/ master of business administration (MBA) •Despite this growing popularity, studies have shown room for improvement in bridging the two separate programs of a dual PharmD/MBA degree and providing additional mentoring to students enrolled in the program

OBJECTIVE

•To measure and assess current student perspectives of a prospective mentorship program for a dual PharmD/MBA program

•To develop an unprecedented dual mentorship program to help provide guidance to students on the complementation of both degrees in the workforce

METHODS

Study Design

 Descriptive Survey (Cross-Sectional) Study Population

- P2, P3, P4 students currently enrolled in the dual PharmD/MBA program at Southern Edwardsville School of Pharmacy (SOP)
- P1 students were excluded from the study because enrollment in the dual degree program begins in the P2 year

Study Measures

- Electronic survey sent through Qualtrics to 48 students in the dual PharmD/MBA degree at SIUE SOP to identify preferences for a mentorship program
- Responses were anonymized to help prevent response bias and remove any hesitation regarding true thoughts and/or opinions about a dual PharmD/MBA mentorship program
- Survey respondents were given approximately three weeks to respond at the beginning of the Fall 2019 semester

Data Analysis

 Sample was described using frequencies/percentages and 5point Likert scale scoring

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•Twenty-five of 48 students surveyed (52%) submitted the electronic survey

•Of the 25 respondents, 8 were P2 students (32%), 8 were P3 students (32%), and 9 were P4 students (36%) •Twenty-four (96%) respondents favored the availability of a mentorship program for the PharmD/MBA program anticipated •Twenty respondents (83%) expressed an participation in 50% or more of mentorship program events •To refine student preferences for a mentorship program, survey questions were objectively measured with the scoring of a 5-point Likert scale, with scores closer to 1 indicating responses closely aligned with "Strongly Disagree" and scores closer to 5 indicating responses closely aligned with "Strongly Agree" •All results can be seen below in Table 1, with the highest scores related to exploring different career options for PharmD/MBA students (4.75) and presenting networking opportunities to PharmD/MBA students (4.67) •The lowest score of the survey was related to required participation for enrolled PharmD/MBA students (2.21) •Online meetings (3.5) were found to have a slight preference over in-person meetings (3.29) •The survey also included one optional question to place any comments; one P4 student noted the importance of online meetings for students on APPEs
