Completion of an Associate in Arts or Science degree at Lewis and Clark Community College fulfills SIUE’s general education requirements with the exception of an Interdisciplinary Studies course that all students must take during their junior or senior year at SIUE.

This “Transfer Program Guide” is an *example* of proposed curriculum for students to use while completing their associate’s degree. Reading, writing, and math placement could alter the course sequencing and transfer date. Therefore, students should begin sequencing their reading/writing (if applicable) and math & science courses during the first semester, paying particular attention to prerequisites. Students have the option of taking summer classes to lessen fall and spring course loads.

ADDITIONAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS/INFORMATION

For all applicants, all of the following 7 *prerequisite courses must be completed with a grade of "C" or better by the end of the preceding semester. Accounting majors, a "B" grade or higher is required for ACCT 131. ENGL 131, ENGL 132, SPCH 131, CIS 135, ECON 151, ECON 152, MATH 131. MATH 165 will be waived for any student that has completed MATH 171 or higher with a grade of "C" or better. ACCT 131 and MATH 165 are required but are no longer prerequisites. Students who are eligible to enroll or do take Math 165, MATH 235 or MATH 171 will not need to take MATH 131. Students should be encouraged to complete, ACCT 131, ACCT 132, MATH 165, and MATH 235. Students must have a 2.25 GPA to apply (2.5 GPA for Accounting). The GPA is determined by all college level coursework taken at all higher education institutions. Our intention is to admit students who demonstrate the greatest likelihood of success. Decisions are based primarily on student performance in collegiate-level work as expressed in the grade point averages and the required essay. Due to the competitive nature of the admission process, not all students who apply are admitted.
