Brief description of the nature of the research/creative activity?

Students will conduct research on the psychology of awe - a (mostly) positive emotion that we feel when we are in the presence of something vast in size (e.g., the grand canyon) or scope (e.g., a newborn baby) that decreases our sense of self and expands our view. We run experiments to determine how awe impacts learning-related and other psychological outcomes.

I also have some unfinished projects related to bias education so students may assist with that too.

Brief description of student responsibilities?

In 2024-25, our lab designed and conducted an experiment examining the effect of awe on learning, love of learning, and belonging. We read a book and some journal articles about awe and discussed and summarized them. Then, we designed an experiment, identifying specific videos to manipulate awe, specified a sample to recruit, and identified surveys and tests that could measure our outcomes. We submitted an IRB application, programmed the study into Qualtrics, analyzed the data in SPSS, and created a poster together to present at a conference in Chicago in April 2025 and other conferences on campus. We will likely work on writing up these results and designing a new study this Fall, which will likely include data collection in person on campus.

Students can expect to improve their:

- 1. Research skills: study design, article reading, specific programs like Qualtrics and SPSS

- 4. Teamwork: communicating with lab, professor, and outside parties
- 5. Professional: career/educational goals, resume/cv development, organization, time management
