Location of research/creative activities:

Mainly remote. Meetings can occur either in my office or on Zoom.

Brief description of the nature of the research/creative activity?

I am working on a new scholarly monograph, which argues that one way to differentiate Black male writers from their literary counterparts is the use of fight scenes. What defines Black male writers historically and today is that they depict Black men who are constantly in battle. Across real and fictional Black narratives, we see several fight scenes. My book will theorize these scenes to uncover their relevance. For this project, I need to gather scholarly sources about Black men, violence and depictions of fight scenes. This proposal is to seek an URCA assistant to help me gather and annotate sources from both history and literature. Honestly,the URCA student I have now is excellent, and I would like to continue working with him in the spring.

Brief description of student responsibilities?

- Read and annotate scholarly writings about African American Literature in the United States. Specifically depictions of Black men and violence.
- Assist with collecting, organizing, and labeling artifacts related to Black Literature. This would include reading sources AND listening to music produced by African Africans, noting references to Black writers who depict fight scenes in their work.
- Assist with literature reviews on this project and reach out to scholars to be interviewed for the project.

URCA Assistant positions are designed to provide students with *research or creative activities* experience. As such, there should be measurable, appropriate outcome goals. What exactly should your student(s) have learned by the end of this experience?

- The student will gain a large body of knowledge about African American Literature and Black male fiction in particular.
- The student will gain experience reading scholarly texts and preparing literature reviews on Black Literature.
- The student will also gain experience producing materials for a wide audience, which includes Humanities scholars and non-academics alike.

The student will also gain experience interfacing with scholars in different fields (which can serve as important connections should the student pursue graduate study in the future)
