Brief description of the nature of the research/creative activity?

Troubled Waters: Critical Hiking at Saint Stanislaus Conservation Area is a digital humanities project that engages visitors to a local hiking trail with histories of enslavement, colonization, and cultural erasure that have shaped it. Saint Stanislaus Conservation Area is a greenspace in St. Louis County. When hikers visit the trail, they encounter pleasant woods, scenic vistas, and some mysterious ruins. People are naturally curious about the ruins! But none of the limited signage at the park explores the site's troubled histories. This project uses digital storytelling to 1) surface those histories for park users, 2) research how human histories are written on the landscape through both buildings and changes to the site's ecology, and 3) investigate how knowledge of the site's past changes people's relationship to the place and how they understand their obligations to people and to the environment.

Brief description of student responsibilities?

Student activities will draw on their major and academic interests to contribute to one or more of the project strands:

Indigenous ecologies and plant knowledge: Students with an interest in ecology and biology will survey plants at the conservation area, researching their status (native, non-native, invasive) and comparing current park ecology to historical species lists to understand how settler presence has transformed the region's ecology. Outputs will include data, as well as storytelling elements that link the ecological data to the project's broader narrative and communicate the research to public audiences.

Histories of enslavement and resilience: Students with an interest in history and sociology will work with historical sources to recover the voices and experiences of Black and indigenous community members. They may also visit local archives, including the Jesuit Archives and Research Center and the State Historical Society of Missouri.

Contemporary relationships to the environment: Students with an interest in ecology, geography, and sociology will work with reviews of the park and trails from Google Reviews, Yelp, and AllTrails. They will conduct text analysis and discourse analysis to understand what it is that people value about the park, where the points of friction are, and how they read the park's history on the trail.
